- Active journeys and our work around cycling and walking to school (Walking bus, bike workshops, cycling proficiency)

An overview of the conclusions or findings of the school's self-evaluation

Parents, children ,governors and staff have been involved in developing our new Tre Uchaf curriculum and contributed to our Tre Uchaf map of experiences, our mission statement, our new curriculum character Buzz , the school vision- Belong, Believe and be the Best you can be!

97% Parents tell us that their children like coming to school. Only 3% don't know. 100% of our parents would recommend our school to others. They tell us that staff are approachable and the teachers care for the children's wellbeing.

They want us to develop our range of after school clubs.

School leaders have identified that the children need to develop more ways to use their skills across all areas of the curriculum and improve pupil voice during lessons.

AOLe teams have monitored curriculum areas and have mapped out learning experiences into year groups to ensure progression and coverage of skill.

Governors would like to develop stronger links with an area of the SDP and play a more active role in supporting staff and pupils to, Be the best they can be!

100% Staff have told us that if they had a concern about their mental well-being they would speak to a school leader however 43% feel stressed about pastoral concerns regarding children.

84% children tell us they feel safe in school. 76% feel listened to but only 59% tell us that they know what to do to improve their work

We need to work on...

- Developing reading, writing, using maths and ICT across the curriculum
- Embedding a whole school approach to mental health and wellbeing by evaluating what we do well and improving on how we listen to learners
- Making sure ALL children know how to improve their work by developing our self and peer assessment strategies
- Improving children's knowledge of rights, values and ethics, diversity and healthy relationships & sexual education
- Further developing enrichment activities which support children's learning experiences to build confidence such as introducing a Year 4 and 5 residential
- Improving our Welsh
- Improving cluster partnerships by developing curriculum domains which are common across all Penyrheol schools and sharing outreach worker to support in a pastoral role
- Improving staff understanding of excellent teaching and learning by providing staff with good quality professional development and sharing good practice with each other
- Improving our outdoor learning provision and after school clubs
